We Hope to See You Next Year!

It's hard to believe the school year is almost over. Since it'll go by quickly with no school a couple of days during fair week and all the end of year activities and trips, I want to remind you of a few things.

First, if you live out of Plaza School District boundaries please get the inter-district transfer requests from your district of residence for next year. Most districts require that you fill out a form annually. Willows' agreement is good for five years. You can get the 2019-20 form from the district office where you reside.

Second, in order to guarantee space in the after school program for next year, please turn in an application and payment. Once we are at capacity, we will not be able to enroll students. The annual fee will continue to be the same as it has for many years; \$180 for one child or \$200 for two or more.

Third, all 6th graders must have the last Tdap (Diphtheria, Tetanus, and Pertussis) booster prior to 7th grade, and all 7th or 8th graders must have their second Varicella (Chickenpox) dose. Lastly, please make sure you have paid all meal balances before the end of the year.

If you know your child will not be returning to Plaza next year, please let us know as soon as possible so we can prepare for next year's enrollment.

The after school SPARK program will not be available Wednesday and Thursday, June 5th and 6th, which are the last two days of school. All students are dismissed at 11:30. **SPARK will not be in session either day.**

Fair Week Attendance:



In the past Plaza School was in session the whole week of the Glenn County Fair and we had all of Thanksgiving week off of school. However, three years ago I changed the schedule to accommodate students who participated in the fair because I wanted to support our 4H students. Unfortunately, many students are now choosing to miss school on Tuesday and Wednesday. I realize it is near the end of the school year so many people may believe it doesn't affect their education, but it does. Our teachers are still planning educational lessons and it is a disruption to the class schedule when the teacher must reteach lessons or spend time ensuring students understand missed assignments. Furthermore, it impacts the attendance rate for Plaza, which reduces important funding. Plaza School's revenue only comes from students who attend school.

While I understand the fair has specific days and times for animals to be registered and weighed, it is important that students check into school at some point during the day. Coming to school tardy is better than absent for the day. Please make an effort to attend Tuesday and Wednesday.

Plaza After School Program:

Applications are available for next years' after school program. Space is limited so please enroll your child(ren) soon. The fee will be the same as previous years; \$180 per year for one child or \$200 for two or more. Your child will not be enrolled if you have any unpaid enrollment fees from the previous school year. Additionally, to ensure your child is enrolled for next year's program, you must submit the <u>full</u> annual fee, as well as the completed application. If you have already submitted your application, but not paid the fee, please do so before the end of the year. Again, only those who turn in payment will be accepted. If you are unable to pay the full fee when you turn in the application, contact Mr. Conklin by email, phone, or feel free to stop by the office.

Meal Account:

As the school year comes to an end it is important that all meal accounts be paid in full.

Please make sure that your student's meal account has a positive balance. Positive balances will be carried over to the new school year. If your child is in 8th grade, any remaining balance will be transferred to a sibling's account or refunded in full by the end of the school year. Starting May 1st the Food Services Department will be running negative balance reminders daily.

 Parents/guardians will be notified with a postcard reminder sent home with student.

REMINDER (6th Grade):

Before the start of the 2019-20 school year, make sure that your incoming 7th grade students are ready! **Vaccines required for 7th grade** (California Code of Regulations (CCR), Title 17, Section 6020) include:



- 1 dose of Tdap
- 2 doses of Varicella
- 2 doses of measles-containing vaccine: most students will have received these before starting Kindergarten, but some may have missed doses along the way.
- Other vaccines encouraged but not required for 7th graders include meningococcal and HPV vaccines.

To avoid the back-to-school rush, we encourage 6th graders to make their vaccine appointments now and provide our office with verification.

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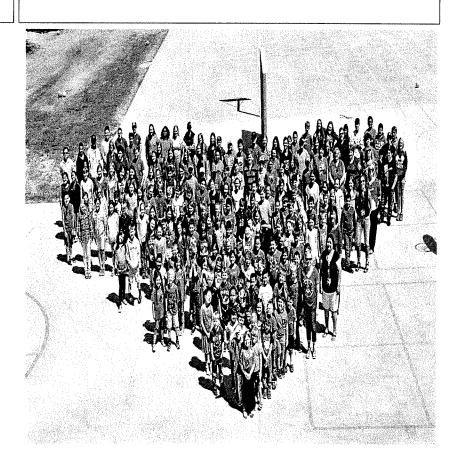
Summer Reading:

SCHOOL-CONNECTED ORGANIZATIONS

Persons proposing to establish a school-connected organization shall submit a request to the Governing Board for authorization to operate at the school. The request for authorization shall contain:

- 1. The name and purpose of the organization
- 2. The date of application
- 3. Bylaws, rules, and procedures under which the organization will operate, including procedures for maintaining the organization's finances, membership qualifications, if any, and an agreement that the group will not engage in unlawful discrimination
- 4. The names, addresses, and phone numbers of all officers
- 5. A list of specific objectives
- 6. An agreement to grant the district the right to audit the group's financial records at any time, either by district personnel or a certified public accountant
- 7. The name of the bank where the organization's account will be located and the names of those authorized to withdraw funds
- 8. The signature of the principal of the supporting school
- 9. Planned use for any money remaining at the end of the year if the organization is not continued or authorized to continue in the future
- 10. An agreement to provide evidence of liability insurance as required by law

Requests for subsequent authorization shall be presented to the Superintendent/Principal or designee annually, along with a financial statement showing all income and expenditures from fund-raisers. If the Superintendent/Principal or designee proposes to deny the request for reauthorization, he/she shall present his recommendation to the Board for approval.

Upon consent of the Superintendent/Principal or designee, school-connected organizations may use the school's name, school team's name, or any logo attributable to the school or district.

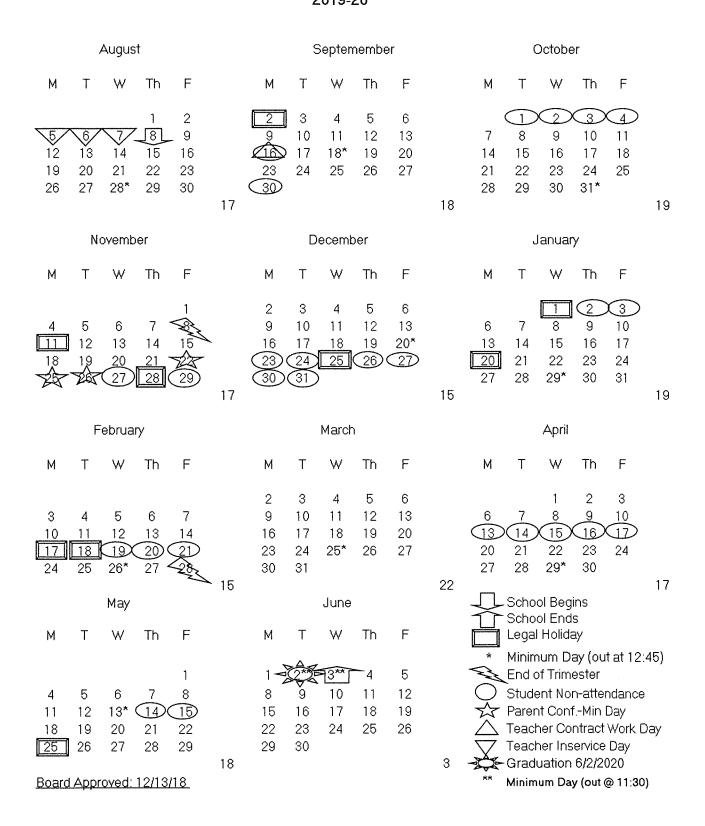
School-connected organizations are prohibited from hiring or directly paying district employees. Organizations may make donations to the district to cover the costs of additional

Response to Immigration Enforcement

The Board of Trustees is committed to the success of all students and believes that every school site should be a safe and welcoming place for all students and their families irrespective of their citizenship or immigration status.

District staff shall not solicit or collect information or documents regarding the citizenship or immigration status of students or their family members or provide assistance with immigration enforcement at district schools, except as may be required by state and federal law. (Education Code 234.7)

No student shall be denied equal rights and opportunities nor be subjected to unlawful discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying in the district's programs and activities on the basis of his/her immigration status. (Education Code 200, 220, 234.1)

The Board of Trustees recognizes the harmful effects of bullying on student learning and school attendance and desires to provide a safe school environment that protects students from physical and emotional harm. District employees shall establish student safety as a high priority and shall not tolerate bullying of any student.

No individual or group shall, through physical, written, verbal, or other means, harass, sexually harass, threaten, intimidate, retaliate, cyberbully, cause bodily injury to, or commit hate violence against any student or school personnel.

Cyberbullying includes the electronic creation or transmission of harassing communications, direct threats, or other harmful texts, sounds, or images as defined in Education Code <u>48900</u>. Cyberbullying also includes breaking into another person's electronic account and assuming that person's identity in order to damage that person's reputation.

Strategies for addressing bullying in district schools shall be developed with involvement of key stakeholders, including students, parents/guardians, and staff, and may be incorporated into the comprehensive safety plan, the local control and accountability plan, and other applicable district and school plans.

As appropriate, the Superintendent/Principal or designee may collaborate with law enforcement, courts, social services, mental health services, other agencies, and community organizations in the development

and implementation of joint strategies to promote safety in schools and the community and to provide services for alleged victims and perpetrators of bullying.

Bullying Prevention

To the extent possible, district schools shall focus on the prevention of bullying by establishing clear rules for student conduct and implementing strategies to promote a positive, collaborative school climate. Students shall be informed, through student handbooks and other appropriate means, of district and school rules related to bullying, mechanisms available for reporting incidents or threats, and the consequences for engaging in bullying.

As appropriate, the district shall provide students with instruction, in the classroom or other educational settings, that promotes social-emotional learning, effective communication and conflict resolution skills, character/values education, respect for cultural and individual differences, self-esteem development, assertiveness skills, and appropriate online behavior.

Such instruction shall also educate students about the negative impact of bullying, discrimination, intimidation, and harassment based on actual or perceived immigration status, religious beliefs and customs, or any other individual bias or prejudice.

The Superintendent/Principal or designee shall provide training to teachers and other school staff to raise their awareness about the legal obligation of the district and its employees to prevent discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying of district students. Such training shall be designed to provide staff with the skills to:

- 1. Discuss the diversity of the student body and school community, including their varying immigration experiences
- 2. Discuss bullying prevention strategies with students, and teach students to recognize the behavior and characteristics of bullying perpetrators and victims
- 3. Identify the signs of bullying or harassing behavior
- 4. Take immediate corrective action when bullying is observed
- 5. Report incidents to the appropriate authorities, including law enforcement in instances of criminal behavior

Based on an assessment of bullying incidents at school, the Superintendent/Principal or designee may increase supervision and security in areas where bullying most often occurs, such as classrooms, playgrounds, hallways, restrooms, and cafeterias.

Intervention

Students are encouraged to notify school staff when they are being bullied or suspect that another student is being victimized. In addition, the Superintendent/Principal or designee shall develop means for students to report threats or incidents confidentially and anonymously.

School staff who witness an act of bullying shall immediately intervene to stop the incident when it is safe to do so. (Education Code 234.1)

When appropriate based on the severity or pervasiveness of the bullying, the Superintendent/Principal or designee shall notify the parents/guardians of victims and perpetrators and may contact law enforcement.

The Superintendent/Principal, principal, or principal's designee may refer a victim, witness, perpetrator, or other student affected by an act of bullying to a school counselor, school psychologist, social worker, child welfare attendance personnel, school nurse, or other school support service personnel for case management, counseling, and/or participation in a restorative justice program as appropriate. (Education Code 48900.9)

Reporting and Filing of Complaints

Any student, parent/guardian, or other individual who believes that a student has been subjected to bullying or who has witnessed bullying may report the incident to a teacher, the principal, a compliance officer, or any other available school employee. Within one business day of receiving such a report, a staff member shall notify the principal of the report, whether or not a uniform complaint is filed. In addition, any school employee who observes an incident of bullying involving a student shall, within one business day, report his/her observation to the principal or a district compliance officer, whether or not the alleged victim files a complaint.

Within two business days of receiving a report of bullying, the principal shall notify the district compliance officer identified in AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

When the circumstances involve cyberbullying, individuals with information about the activity shall be encouraged to save and print any electronic or digital messages that they feel constitute cyberbullying and to notify a teacher, the principal, or other employee so that the matter may be investigated. When a student uses a social networking site or service to bully or harass another student, the Superintendent/Principal or designee may file a request with the networking site or service to suspend the privileges of the student and to have the material removed.

When a report of bullying is submitted, the principal or a district compliance officer shall inform the student or parent/guardian of the right to file a formal written complaint in accordance with AR 1312.3. The student who is the alleged victim of the bullying shall be given an opportunity to describe the incident, identify witnesses who may have relevant information, and provide other evidence of bullying.

Investigation and Resolution of Complaints

Any complaint of bullying shall be investigated and, if determined to be discriminatory, resolved in accordance with law and the district's uniform complaint procedures specified in AR 1312.3.

If, during the investigation, it is determined that a complaint is about nondiscriminatory bullying, the principal or designee shall inform the complainant and shall take all necessary actions to resolve the complaint.

Discipline

Corrective actions for a student who commits an act of bullying of any type may include counseling, behavioral intervention and education, and, if the behavior is severe or pervasive as defined in Education Code 48900, may include suspension or expulsion in accordance with district policies and regulations.

RESIDENCY FOR HOMELESS CHILDREN

Homeless students living in the district shall be admitted to the district school upon presentation of any of the following:

- 1. Hotel or motel receipts
- 2. A letter from a social service agency or homeless shelter verifying that the student lives within the district

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Memorandum of Understanding Between Plaza Elementary School District and Glenn County Office of Education

<u>Purpose</u>

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) establishes a formal working relationship between Plaza Elementary School District and Glenn County Office of Education (GCOE) acting as partners in the After School Education and Safety Program (ASES). The goals and objectives of our collaboration are to expand learning opportunities for students, families, and community members; to provide academic, enrichment, mentoring, and tutoring educational support; to develop cultural and linguistic competence; to offer opportunities for after school and summer recreation; to provide center-based and linked health, social, and safety services; to provide technology and career training to students; and to expand school and community participation in drug-free, supervised, and fun activities to be provided in safe and supervised learning environments.

The ASES program in collaboration with the school site and district will provide activities that support student academic achievement in language arts, math, and science that are aligned with California Common Core Content Standards. The After School program will provide activities that support development of students' positive character and behavior traits, including drug, alcohol, and tobacco prevention and violence prevention, including cyber bullying.

Description of Services

Plaza Elementary School will support the After School Education and Safety Program by providing site administration, staffing, food services, facility use, and provide the opportunity for connection with instructional day programming. Plaza Elementary will ensure the following assurances are implemented into the program:

- 1. The program will maintain at a minimal 85% of the required average daily attendance of 46 students
- 2. The program will include an educational and literacy element designed to provide tutoring and/or homework assistance in one or more of the following subject areas: language arts, mathematics, history and social science, science, and computer training.
- 3. The program will have an educational enrichment element that may include, but is not limited to: fine arts, career technical education, recreation, physical fitness, and prevention activities. Such activities might involve the arts, music, physical activity, health promotion, general recreation, technology, career awareness, and activities to support positive youth development.
- 4. The program will provide a safe physical and emotional environment and opportunities for relationship building and will promote active student engagement.
- 5. The program will collaborate and integrate with the regular school day program and other extended learning opportunities.
- 6. The program will agree that snacks made available through a program shall conform to the nutrition standards in Article 2.5 (commencing with EC Section 49430) of Chapter 9 of Part 27 of Division 4 of Title 2. The program will agree that meals made available through a program shall conform to the nutrition standards of the United States Department of Agriculture's at-risk afterschool meal component of the Child and Adult Care Food Program (EC sections 8482.3[d][1], 8482.3[d][2], and 8483.3[c][8]).
- 7. The program will provide opportunities for physical activity. (EC Section 8483.3[c][7]).

- 8. The program is planned through a collaborative process that includes parents, youth, and representatives of participating public school sites, governmental agencies (e.g., city and county parks and recreation departments), local law enforcement, community organizations, and the private sector.
- 9. The program will maintain a student to staff member ratio of no more than 20:1.
- 10. The program will begin operation immediately upon the end of the regular school day. (Note: A regular school day is any day that students attend and instruction takes place.)
- 11. The program will operate for a minimum of 15 hours per week.
- 12. The program will operate until at least 6:00 p.m., on every regular school day.
- 13. The program will establish a reasonable early release policy for students attending the after school component.
- 14. Elementary school and middle school or junior high pupils should participate in the full day of the program every day during which pupils participate (EC Section 8483[a][2]).
- 15. Every student attending a school operating a program is eligible to participate in the program, subject to program capacity.
- 16. The program is not required to charge family fees or conduct individual eligibility determination based on need or income.
- 17. If 15 percent or more of the pupils enrolled in a public school that provides instruction in Kindergarten or any of grades 1 to 12, inclusive, speak a single primary language other than English, as determined from the census data submitted to the CDE in the preceding year, all notices, reports, statements, or records sent to the parent or guardian of any such pupil by the school or school district shall, in addition to being written in English, be written in the primary language, and may be responded to either in English or the primary language (EC Section 48985 [a]).
- 18. The program will establish qualifications for each position so that all staff members directly supervising students meet the minimum qualifications of an instructional aide, pursuant to the policies of the district.
- 19. Staff and volunteers will fulfill health screening and fingerprint clearance requirements in current law and in compliance with school district, private school, or agency policy.
- 20. The program will provide staff training and development.
- 21. A program may provide a maximum of three staff development days a year during regular program hours using grant funds.
- 22. The program will keep accurate program attendance records and report actual attendance to GCOE on a monthly basis.
- 23. The program will report school day attendance rates for participating students.
- 24. The program will meet all evaluation requirements, including participation in a statewide evaluation process as determined by the CDE, and provide all required information on a timely basis.
- 25. The program will provide information for the statewide independent evaluation.
- 26. The program will respond to any additional surveys or other methods of data collection that may be required throughout the life of the program.
- 27. The program agrees to provide information to the department for the purpose of program evaluation and will certify that program evaluations will be based upon any requirements recommended by the Advisory Committee on Before and After School Programs and adopted by the state board, including the annual outcome-based data for evaluation (EC sections 8482.3[f][7], 8482.3[f][8], 8483.3[c][11], and 84884[a]).
- 28. The program will expend no more than 15 percent of overall grant funding on administrative costs, which include indirect costs.

- 29. The program will ensure that no less than 85 percent of that funding is allocated to school sites for direct services to pupils. The cost of a program site supervisor may be included as direct services provided that at least 85 percent of the site supervisor's time is spent at the program site (EC Section 8483.9[c]).
- 30. All funds expended will supplement, but not supplant, existing funding for afterschool programs. State categorical funds for remedial education activities shall not be used to make the required contribution of local funds for those after school programs. (EC sections 8483.5[e] and 8483.7[b]).
- 31. Each partner in the application agrees to share responsibility for the quality of the program (EC Section 8482.3[f][5]).
- 32. The program agrees to follow all fiscal reporting and auditing standards required by the CDE (EC Section 8482.3[f][5]).
- 33. First priority for enrollment of pupils in an after school program shall be given to homeless youth and pupils identified by the program as being in foster care (EC Section 8483[c][1][a]) and second priority shall be given to middle and junior high pupils who attend program daily (EC Section 8483[c][1][b]).
- 34. The program will engage in community collaboration, including, but not limited to, demonstrated support of the school site principal and staff (EC Section 8483.3[c][6]).
- 35. The program will engage in the collection and use of social, behavioral, or skill development data collection to support quality program improvement process (EC Section 8483.3[c][12]).
- 36. The program will provide an amount of cash or in-kind local funds equal to not less than one-third of the total grant from the school district, governmental agencies, community organizations, or the private sector. Facilities or space usage may fulfill not more than 25 percent of the required local contribution (EC Section 8483.7[a]7]).
- 37. The program acknowledges that State categorical funds for remedial education activities shall not be used to make the required contribution of local funds for those school programs (EC Section 84843.7[b]).
- 38. The program will provide documentation of details and amounts of how in-kind contribution is allocated. (Documentation forms will be provided by the County Office of Education)
- 39. The program shall submit evidence of a data driven program quality improvement process that is based on CDE's guidance on program quality standards (EC Section 8484[a][2]).

Glenn County Office of Education will support Plaza Elementary SPARK by providing the following services:

- 1. Transference of ASES After School funds in the amount listed below.
- 2. Training and Professional Development Opportunities
- 3. Fiscal Grant Management to include:
 - a. Submission of annual state report
 - b. Submission of quarterly expenditure reports
 - c. Submission of bi-annual attendance reports
- 4. Area and Oversight Coordination
- 5. Continuous Quality Improvement Report Monitoring

Plaza Elementary School District will receive 88% of the ASES grant award allocated to Plaza Elementary School District. GCOE will retain an Indirect Cost of 12% of allocated grant amount. Award notifications will be sent out annually upon receipt of notifications from CDE.

Terms

The terms of this MOU shall commence on **July 1**, **2019** and are renewable thereafter from year to year unless either partner gives prior written notice of termination. This MOU may be modified or terminated in thirty (60) days upon written notice of intention to terminate the agreement with or without cause.

Plaza School District will use state and federal funds to help maximize conditions of learning by providing a broad course of studies taught by highly qualified staff. Programs will be standards-aligned, rigorous, and take place in facilities that are in good repair. Federal funds will supplement and improve the actions and services paid for with state funds to improve student learning. Additionally, funds will pay for quality instruction and curriculum to prepare students for high school through a research based intervention program.

Plaza School only receives approximately \$4,500 in Title money annually, plus \$10,000 Title IV Part A funds spent in 2018-19 and 2019-20. Also, Plaza School received a one time Low Performing Student Block Grant for \$19,760 that must be spend by 2019-20. The Title I Part A money decreased from \$13,000 to \$1,500 in 2019-20. This money will be used to pay for part of a reading program. Title II Part A will be \$1,400, which will be used for professional development. The Title III Part A, Title IV Part A, and LPSBG money will be used with state funds to purchase science and social studies curriculum.
